Faculty Achievement

Valparaiso University School of Law professor Rebecca Huss recently received two awards for her work as guardian/special master of the American pit bull terriers formerly owned by Michael Vick in the Bad Newz Kennels case. Dr. Huss, a nationally-recognized expert on animal law, was honored with a 2008 Law Enforcement Public Service Award from the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Virginia and an Award of Excellence from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Office of Inspector General.

Last October, Dr. Huss was named guardian/special master in the civil forfeiture case involving Vick and given responsibility for observing the dogs, reviewing evaluation reports from animal care professionals and interacting with evaluation teams to make recommendations for their future. Her recommendation to place 47 of the pit bulls with eight rescue organizations was approved in December by the judge overseeing the case.

"I am hopeful that the attention brought to this case can raise awareness about who are the true victims in dog-fighting cases - the dogs," Huss said. "Many people had to work together to achieve the positive resolution in this case, including the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals evaluation team, Bay Area Dog Lovers Responsible About Pit Bulls, the Virginia shelters that cared for the dogs and, of course, all the people at the federal government who did what was necessary to consider the dogs as individuals."

Valpo on Top Again!

Valparaiso University has been named a recipient of the prestigious Senator Paul Simon Award for Campus Internationalization, which recognizes the University as a model for other institutions of higher education in preparing graduates with strong cross-cultural skills and global awareness.

Valpo is one of just five institutions in the United States to be honored with this award by NAFSA: Association of International Educators, the world's largest professional association dedicated to campus internationalization efforts. The University's accomplishments in promoting international education will be featured in their report, "Internationalizing the Campus 2008: Profiles of Success at Colleges and Universities," this fall, and will also be recognized at the upcoming annual NAFSA conference in Washington, D.C.

Mechanical Engineering/Mathematics alumnus Nick Skyland '02 has a job that is "out of this world." Nick is currently project manager of the Extravehicular Activity (EVA) Physiology, Systems and Performance (EPSF) Project at NASA's Johnson Space Center. This scientific and research effort examines human performance during space walks, with the aim of developing more safe and efficient systems for exploration missions and NASA's Constellation Program. Nick is also currently on rotation as the Technical Assistant to the Deputy Associate Administrator for Strategic Partnerships at NASA, where he supports the agency in further developing partnerships to help NASA with its exploration mission.

Nick has extensive experience managing projects and research efforts which utilize analogue testing environments, such as the underwater and NASA's partial gravity simulator, which simulates weightlessness in order to characterize human performance and space suit interactions. Prior to joining Space Life Sciences, he worked at NASA's Neutral Buoyancy Laboratory (NBL), where he was responsible for Extravehicular Activity training and real-time flight support for the International Space Station and Space Shuttle programs.

He says that his greatest career success thus far was when he was invited to take part in a special initiative and give a presentation at NASA called the "Generation Y Perspectives" presentation, which discussed NASA and space exploration from the points of view of those born from 1977-2000. This presentation has since been given to several civil servant and contractor management teams as well as at national conferences, and has made a direct impact on the future



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of the space program by inspiring the recruitment of more young engineers and scientists at NASA.

"Sending in my acceptance letter to Valparaiso University was the best decision I ever made," Nick says. "Although at the time I didn't realize it, Valpo forged a value system and work ethic that has since provided a very solid foundation to navigate through life's hard decisions and events. Instead of being just another engineer that is focused in on the details, I've been trained to think bigger – to look at the whole problem – and to make a decision based not only on the technical merit but also on how it impacts people, relationships, and organizations."
